Curriculum Overview	English:
Term 2	English
	Students will engage in a sequence of units throughout the year, which have been developed by the Department of Education, integrating, and covering all outcomes and content for: oral language and communication, vocabulary, reading (fluency and comprehension), writing, spelling, handwriting and digital transcription and understanding and responding to literature. The units support cumulative, explicit, and systematic teaching of foundational literacy skills as well as conceptual understanding of English.
	Below is a list of the Term 2 units and a brief overview of their focus topic: Characterisation
	Students will gain a deeper understanding of the textual concepts of characterisation and narrative. They will explore the development of characters as depicted through their appearance, words, thoughts and actions. Students will explore the models of behaviour presented and how the relationship between characters enhances a reader's engagement with the text. They will create imaginative and informative texts, drawing on their knowledge of characterisation as well as historical knowledge gained.

Imagery, symbol and connotation

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Students will gain a deeper understanding of the textual concept of imagery, symbol and connotation and the supporting concept of genre. Students will discover that literature does not always follow the form and function of a single genre, and that symbols are used within both written texts and illustrations. Students will apply their knowledge of symbol, imagery and genre in the creation of a narrative picture book with poetic elements.

Mathematics- Term 2 overview:

- The number system extends infinitely to very large and very small numbers
- Multiplicative thinking involves flexible use of multiplication and division concepts, strategies and representations
- Visual representations help understands aspects of our world (chance and position)
- What needs to be measured determines the unit of measure
- Angles are the primary structural component of many shapes

Integrated Unit – The Road to Federation

Students will investigate the formation of an Australian Federation by using a variety of learning strategies, such as cooperative learning activities and inquiry-based tasks. They will study the origins of our system of national government and learn about the key figures and reasons for uniting as a nation. They will critically analyse the different attitudes towards federation at the time and research the development of our constitution. Through analysis of primary and secondary sources, students will identify the key elements of our system of government and investigate its origins. They will learn about the Magna Carta and investigate the Westminster and American political systems to help them identify their influences on the development of the Australian system of government.

Personal Development/Health- This term students investigate safe and unsafe features of specific environments and explore actions to enhance their own and others' safety and wellbeing. Through practical application students develop help-seeking skills and adopt strategies to help keep themselves and others safe. Students develop their ability to analyse and gather information to make informed decisions, assess risk and find solutions to promote their own and others' health, safety and wellbeing.

Physical Education- During this term, Stage 3 students will learn how to combine sequences of movements and control their bodies using balance, flexibility and coordination to participate in activities, games and sports. Students will also focus on correct skills and actions for performing athletics track and field events in the lead up to our school athletics carnival.

Equipment requirements

All equipment needs to be clearly labelled, particularly school jumpers as the cooler weather approaches.

Please ensure your child has an adequate supply of lead pencils, pens, rubbers and sharpeners to last them the term.

Homework and home reading

Home reading is very important as it allows children to practise their reading skills and improve their general reading ability and comprehension. All students are encouraged to read at least 15 minutes each day. Students may use their own books from home or borrow from the library.

Stage 3 students will be completing a public speaking task as their homework this term. More information will be sent home in the coming weeks.

Students also have access to Mathletics to support the consolidation of maths tasks at home.

	 meeting with Principals, Head Teachers, Learning and Support teachers, School Counsellors, and Year Advisors sharing academic information identifying social and emotional needs, and organising transition programs, including extra transition for identified students. For those choosing a Public High School for your child, your High School has access to detailed information about your child's learning needs, through NSW Department of Education data platforms, to help them make the best decisions they can to support your child.
	We are also able to analyse the NAPLAN result trends of Wyrallah Road PS students (no names identified) in Years 7 and 9 to inform our school's planning processes around curriculum delivery.
	For those parents exercising their right to choose and send their child to a private or independent high school in 2025, WRPS staff will not be completing personal referral documents, including assessments and scholarship applications. We have provided comprehensive mid-year and end of year reports covering academic achievement and work habits each year that your child has attended Wyrallah Road Public School. Your child's reports and their Years 3 and 5 NAPLAN reports provide your school of choice with ample evidence to make wise decisions. There is no need for you to feel that your choice disadvantages your child in any way.
Crunch and Sip	Each day, students are encouraged to eat a serve of fresh fruit or vegetables and drink water during the morning session. This gives students an extra boost to get through the long morning session while they are working in class.
