CURRICULUM

English

Students will engage in a sequence of units throughout the year, which have been developed by the Department of Education, integrating, and covering all outcomes and content for: oral language and communication, vocabulary, reading (fluency and comprehension), writing, spelling, handwriting and digital transcription and understanding and responding to literature. The units support cumulative, explicit, and systematic teaching of foundational literacy skills as well as conceptual understanding of English.

Below is a list of the Term 2 units and a brief overview of their focus topic.

Argument and Authority

Students will use the mentor text to analyse representations of ideas in literature through genre that reflect 'argument and authority'. Students will adapt these representations when creating a persuasive text and a hybrid text that does not follow the form and function of a single genre.

Imagery, Symbol and Connotation

Students will apply their understanding of imagery, symbol and connotation to analyse and experiment with composing different genres of poetry. They will identify how perspective is conveyed through authorial choices used in poetry. Students will use figurative language and a range of literary devices to collaboratively create and perform a slam poem that evokes an emotional response from an audience.

Mathematics

Students will engage in a sequence of units throughout the year, which have been developed by the Department of Education, integrating, and covering all outcomes and content for number and algebra, measurement and space and statistics and probability. The units connect the learning of a range of mathematical concepts and skills under 'big ideas'. They provide opportunities for students to use mathematical reasoning skills through rich tasks and cater for student needs with activities for varying skill levels.

Below is a list of the 'big ideas' for Term 2 units and the mathematical concepts they cover.

- The number system extends infinitely to very large and very small numbers: representing numbers, multiplicative relations.
- Multiplicative thinking involves flexible use of multiplication and division concepts, strategies and representations.
- Visual representations help to understand aspects of the world (chance and position).
- What needs to be measured determines the unit of measurement.
- Angles are the primary structural component of many shapes.



HOMEWORK AND HOME-READING

Home reading is very important as it allows children to practise their reading skills and improve their general reading ability and comprehension. All students are encouraged to read at least 15 minutes each day. Students may use their own books from home or borrow from the library. Stage 3 students will partake in a term-long homework task that supports them to learn more about the events of the Gold Rush in Australia. More information will be sent home soon.

CURRICULUM

Integrated Unit- Eureka!

Students explore the arrival of the Europeans and the impacts of colonisation, including the effects on Indigenous Australians and the struggles for both colonists and convicts. Students use their knowledge of early settlements to explore significant events in history, such as the Gold Rush, Eureka Stockade and Federation. Students look at multicultural Australia through immigration schemes and migration statistics. Students will have multiple opportunities to engage in STEM projects throughout the term, engaging with the design thinking model and learning how to work as a team.

Personal Development/Health

This term we will learn more about what it means to be safe as a passenger and pedestrian. Within this unit, students will learn and develop the skills required to recognise and demonstrate safe choices when crossing the road, walking on footpaths and riding bikes/scooters. Students will also learn more about the safe behaviours required when travelling in a car and when entering/exiting a car.

Physical Education

During this term, Stage 3 students will learn how to combine sequences of movements and control their bodies using balance, flexibility and coordination to participate in gymnastics activities. This term our sport day will be on Tuesday.

Stage 3 have two excursions this year. One for Year 6 and one for Year 5 students. Year 6 head to Sydney/Canberra for five nights in July. Year 5 head to the Coffs Coast for 2 nights in December. Details about both of these excursions have already been shared with families. As the excursions draw closer, more information regarding what to pack and the itineraries will be shared.

COMMUNICATION
